2 "Monday is rainy" - context, registers, and writing systems: "Monday is rainy" is not normal unmarked English. Native speakers would typically say: Monday was rainy (past observation)

The reason is that in the first sentence, "today is rainy", today is the object being described directly, so you don't need the pronoun 'it'. In the second however, there is a comma so after the comma, the 'it'



word usage

Today is a rainy day. In your first sentence, either rainy or raining could fit, depending on what you actually want to say; " because it is raining" indicates that water is physically falling from the sky

"It was raining" vs. "It rained" -

Do the sentence "It was raining" and the sentence "It rained" mean the same thing? Another example: "I walked to the park" vs. "I was walking to the park" mean the same thing? When to use which?



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
